

BUILDING A POSITIVE FUTURE

Lewis¹ was 15 years old and had attended a Pupil Referral Unit² prior to starting at college in 2016. He enrolled on an entry-level construction course, knowing that he had a trial at Crown Court coming up and the real threat of a custodial sentence hanging over him. He was clearly keen to start a new phase of his life and to progress forward. That is not to say it has all gone perfectly since then; unfortunately, he has had disciplinary discussions with his personal tutor and the head of school. However, he has been keen to learn construction skills and to improve his Maths and English. This has meant that he has needed to attend classes in his own time. Despite these challenges and obstacles, Lewis has been determined to build a better future for himself, through further education (FE).



Recently, Lewis has been getting positive feedback for his general attitude towards self-improvement from various members of staff across the college. This is great news for his self-esteem and confidence, which will provide a strong foundation for his next steps in education, training and work.

Lewis is a young person who was on the wrong path and has used his year at college to make the necessary change. As a result of the Crown Court case, Lewis was put on a tag; this was seen as a positive outcome, as the sentence was influenced by the positive statements from the college. The tag has now been removed and Lewis is continuing his personal improvement. There is still a little way to go until the end of the year and for him to be 'work-ready', but in the past six months he is showing all the signs of having found a turning point in his chosen path. Lewis has progressed onto a plastering apprenticeship and in addition to the plastering work, now attends college one day a week.

What has really made a difference for Lewis is having people around him who can support him and go the extra mile for him – to look out for him and help him if he is faltering. This has helped give him a firmer foundation to strive to achieve from, even on the tougher days.

The college where Lewis studied benefits from having a team of volunteer mentors and enablers. Each year, these volunteers help young people like Lewis, and hundreds of others, to learn how to build resilience, confidence and self-esteem and to keep on the right track. A senior pastor with the New Testament Church of God, Lester Freckleton³, says that colleges are crying out for members in our communities to get involved as college mentors.
